David Nicholson Newcomer Award

Stud Staff Award

\$5,000 to the winner, which is match funded with \$5,000 to the winner's stud. \$2,000 is also awarded to both runners-up, as well as \$2,000to their stud.

Dedication Award

\$5,000 to the winner, which is match funded with \$5,000 to the winner's yard/stud. \$2,000is also awarded to both runners-up, as well as \$2,000 to their yard/stud.

Community Award (in recognition of Rory MacDonald)

\$5,000 to the winner, which is match funded with \$5,000 to the charity of their choice. \$2,000 is also awarded to both runners-up, as well as \$2,000 awarded to the charities of their choice.

The Employee of the Year Award

£10,000 to the winner, with the same amount going to their yard/stud.

The winners of the Leadership, Rider/Groom, Stud, Dedication categories are eligible to win this category.

Ella Garland started working weekends at Nick Gifford Racing during 2020 and despite having no background in racing, she has quickly established herself as an important member of the team.

Ella's colleagues have remarked upon the impact she has had on morale and spirit at the yard, and how she has already marked herself out as a role model for colleagues and a tremendous ambassador for our sport.

She is skilled on the back of a horse, with colleagues remarking upon her calm and natural riding style that has seen her handle some of the trickier characters in the yard. The defining characteristic of Elouise O'Hart's young career to date has been perseverance. Now Assistant Head Girl to Ed Walker, things were not going so well in February 2020 as she struggled to settle at the yard.

But Elouise stuck at it and began to make rapid and remarkable progress, turning around her fortunes and thriving in a role of significant responsibility. This transformation has been described as "nothing short of astounding" and Elouise has demonstrated an exemplary attitude towards the horses in her care and her colleagues, playing a key role in the social life of the stable as well as being diligent in her duties. Debbie Brodie worked in finance and then as a trampolining coach before making the switch to her current role as a Junior Stud Hand with Godolphin.

Debbie had never considered a career in racing until her partner began to look into it. Exposure to horses through him left her determined to work with the animals and at the age of 49, she took the plunge. After completing the National Stud E2SE course Debbie joined Godolphin in January 2021 as a student working at Dalham Hall Stud.

In a short time, Debbie has made a huge impression on her colleagues.

Now regarded as one of the most valued senior members of staff on the team, it is easy to see why given Vova's remarkable versatility. He can, according to his colleagues, ride anything, fix anything and undertake practically any task, all with a smile permanently affixed to his face. The fledgling training career of James Ferguson has started strongly thanks in no small part to the hard work of Alyson West, in whom Ferguson has complete faith when she travels with horses from their Savile House Stables base in Newmarket.

It is hardly a surprise given her 30 years of experience at Sir Mark Prescott's Heath House Stables, where only the best is good enough. This wealth of experience has proven invaluable for a young, up-and-coming team, with her firstclass horsemanship and attention to detail setting the standard to which all must aspire. In 12 years at the right hand of trainer Philip Kirby, Simon Olley has seen the yard develop from having 10 horses to its current standing as the base of Graded and Listed-winning horses.

Simon is considered a horseman of remarkable talent and a leader of equal stature, his knowledge and experience of horses and the sport making him the perfect person to inspire and counsel less experienced colleagues.

Andrew Braithwaite holds the title of Finance Director at the British Racing School but this does not do justice to the breadth of his work at the BRS.

In 2020, Andrew co-founded the Newmarket Pony Academy to provide access to ponies for local children whose families would be otherwise unable to fund the opportunity. Its remarkable success has seen it become fully booked through the 2021/22 school year.

Finalists

Harry Enright arrived at the BRS in 2020 and Andrew recognised his passion for riding straight away. Harry was born with one hand, and Andrew set about developing an attachment for Harry's existing prosthesis that would enable him to ride safely. Freedom Zampaladus's life changed when, at 14, having moved to the Caribbean, he was introduced to racehorses, thoroughbreds through his uncle's raceyard.

Despite challenging circumstances, at age 17, he held a training license and won many races before returning to the UK aged 19. Here, he became aware of the lack of accessibility to equestrianism for people from ethnic minority backgrounds and urban areas.

This led to him setting up the Urban Equestrian Academy in Leicester in 2015, and today the academy has over 100 members weekly and a number of programmes including a bespoke programme for those with an interest in horseracing to go on to work in the racing industry. Kevin and Pam Atkinson gave up their previous careers to create the charity New Beginnings, in order to provide a safe and supportive environment for many of the most vulnerable former racehorses to adapt and learn new skills after they have finished their first career in racing. Now, in their twelfth year, they have developed the expertise to ensure every horse that passes through their operation is afforded the time and security they need and deserve.

Engagement with the community is key for New Beginnings. They visit many Yorkshire racecourses, where they take former racehorses to meet the racing public and positively promote the life of the racehorses both during and after racing. "It was a real privilege



Retraining of Racehorses

Managed by the British Horseracing Authority, careersinracing.com is a portal of information on careers across the whole of the racing industry. The team implements recruitment initiatives and marketing campaigns to promote racing careers and pathways to a range of audiences from school age to those looking to change careers. The popular job board on careersinracing processes over 1000 jobs a year and is free to use for all racing's employers. RoR is British Horseracing's official charity for the welfare of horses who have retired from racing. The charity promotes the versatility and adaptability of racehorses for other equestrian activities following their retirement from racing. It also protects their welfare through a nationwide 'safety net' that is available to assist any former racehorse in need of charitable support. In such cases, the charity provides funding for the provision of expert care, prior to suitable rehoming.
